<ul style="list-style-type: none"><input type="checkbox"/> Communicate: Communicate regularly with families and staff, and emphasize the importance of staying home when sick, physical distancing of six feet as much as possible, and hand hygiene.<input type="checkbox"/> Ensure staff are trained in health and safety protocols for your site<input type="checkbox"/> Students/teachers at high risk for health problems from COVID-19 should consult with their health care provider when considering whether to provide or participate in K-12 activities.<input type="checkbox"/> • Face Coverings: All students, staff, volunteers, and guests must wear cloth face coverings in K-12 settings<input type="checkbox"/> Hygiene Practices: Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Children and adults should wash hands when they arrive at school, before meals or snacks, after outside time, after going to the bathroom, after nose blowing or sneezing, and before leaving to go home.	<p>Regular communication will take place through face-to-face conversation, written note, text messages, or emails.</p> <p>Staff will follow health and safety protocols as outlined later in this document.</p> <p>Any at risk person will be asked to consult with their health care provider before participating in activities.</p> <p>Face Coverings will be required for all persons when indoors and activity is in close proximity.</p> <p>We will promote the hygiene of hand washing with reminders to do so by the sinks and from the teacher as students come and go, before meals, before and after playtime, after using the restroom, and after coughing, sneezing, or nose blowing.</p>

<p><input type="checkbox"/> Cleaning and Disinfecting Procedures</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Schools should have infection control plans, updated to reflect what is known about COVID-19. • Increase how often you clean! • Current guidance for cleaning and disinfection for COVID-19 from the CDC states that disinfectants should be registered by the EPA for use against the virus. • Clean and disinfect high-touch surfaces each night after students leave. <p><input type="checkbox"/> Outdoor Areas: Outdoor areas, like playgrounds in schools and parks, generally require normal routine cleaning, but do not require disinfection.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Ventilation: Ventilation is important to have good indoor air quality. Offer more outside time, open windows often, and adjust the HVAC system to allow the maximum amount of outside air to enter the program space.</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Physical distancing recommendations should not prevent a school from offering full-time, in person learning to all students/families in the Fall.</p> <p>Practice physical distancing of at least three feet or more between students in classroom settings, and at least six feet or more in certain circumstances to the degree possible and reasonable that allows for full-time, in person learning for all students.</p>	<p>Regular cleaning of the facility will occur weekly.</p> <p>High-touch surfaces will be disinfected daily.</p> <p>Infection control will take place as parents keep children home when there are symptoms of something contagious, students and staff will use good hand washing hygiene, and mask and distancing protocols will be followed as much as is practical and safe.</p> <p>Outdoor areas will be maintained as usual.</p> <p>Good ventilation will be promoted by using high quality air filters and changing them regularly. Windows will be opened when it is practical. Outdoor activities will be promoted.</p> <p>Physical distancing of 3 to 6 feet will be followed as much as is possible, practical, and safe.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li data-bbox="199 623 816 793">☐ All cases of COVID-19 and outbreaks in schools must be reported to the local health jurisdiction per Washington State law (WAC 246-101). In addition, schools and the general public must cooperate with public health authorities in the investigation of cases and outbreaks that may be associated with the school (WAC 246-101). <li data-bbox="199 827 816 1318">☐ The School COVID-19 Coordinator must also gather information about everyone the student or staff with COVID-19 may have been in close contact with at the school during their infectious period. A close contact is someone who was within six feet of the student or staff with COVID-19 for at least 15 cumulative minutes over a 24-hour period during the time the student or staff with COVID-19 was infectious. A close contact may vary in some situations (i.e., less time spent in close proximity to an unmasked person who is coughing, direct cough/sneeze spray, or other contact that is more intense [e.g., sharing drinks, eating utensils, etc.]). The ultimate determination of close contact is made in cooperation with local public. The infectious period of someone with COVID-19 starts two days before the start of symptoms or is estimated as two days before the test date if a student or staff with COVID-19 did not exhibit symptoms.	<p data-bbox="837 623 1403 705">Any cases of COVID-19 will be reported to Okanogan County Health. We will cooperate with Okanogan County Health in whatever way we are able.</p>
